This set up a "winner takes all" final group game on Sunday morning against the hosts Shetland. In a much tighter match, the Orkney lads sneaked home by two holes to set up a final against Lybster Golf Club, who themselves had stunned defending champions Reay in their final group match to make the final.

The final itself was another tight affair but both the pairings from Kirkwall eventually came out on top with Steven Rendall and Lee Findlay winning two up and Michael Schinkel and Steven Walls going one better, winning three up for a final victory by five shots.

Nearer home, last Monday saw the July seniors medal played. Eighteen player's took part. Andy Kemp was third with 31 stableford points, second was Stephen Hagan on 33, but winning the medal on a steady 36 points, was Bruce Sutherland.

Wednesday then saw the first round of the Flotilla Cup played in very average weather with a strong south westerly and some heavy rain. Thirty nine played, all looking for a decent first round in pursuit of one of the most sought after internal cups.

Darren Tait and Robbie Norquoy led the way with nett 67s, with Pete McKinlay and Stevie Linklater a further shot behind on 68s. A further 10 player's were also within five shots.
